
April 16th - D.C. Emancipation Day On Line Commemoration 12:00 - 7:00 p.m. EST

April 19, 1866: African American citizens of Washington, D.C. celebrate the abolition of slavery. 4,000 to 5,000 people assembled on Franklin Square and marched to the White House, where they were addressed by President Andrew Johnson. Led by two black regiments, they marched past 10,000 cheering spectators. A sign on top of the speaker's platform read: "We have received our civil rights. Give us the right of suffrage and the work is done." (Wood engraving from sketch by F. Dielman in Harper's Weekly, May 12, 1866, p. 300)


